#### WEEK OF THE YOUNG CHILD

The National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) established the Week of the Young Child more than 45 years ago to bring attention to the importance of early learning experiences for young children. Typically, the week of celebration falls during our spring break, but this year we will be in session, so we are planning to participate in the celebration by planning special activities throughout the week of April 24-28.

NAEYC provides some ideas that we can springboard from. This year, they have designated each day of the week with a special focus. #### **PENCIL GRIP**

The way a child holds their crayon, marker or pencil is developmental. During the preschool years we want to work towards good grip habits so when they enter Kindergarten they have good habits established.



Around one year old, a child should begin to be allowed to hold a crayon for supervised coloring activities. Their grip normally looks like this.

When a child is between 2 and 3 years old, the grip might look like this when they hold a crayon.

As their grip continues to develop, their grip begins to take shape. By four years old, your child should be able to hold their pencil in a modified tripod position as illustrated here.

In Kindergarten, they will need to be able to hold their pencil like this and have good control over their pencil grip.

Here you will find instructions on how to hold a pencil and some ideas for training tools. We work with your child on their grip here at school. Giving your child writing opportunities and encouraging them with their grip at home will help with the partnership we strive for between school and home.

Provide opportunities at home for writing and drawing. Give them pads and paper in different settings. Set up a writing area in the house like we have here where they can "write" to friends and family. Including stickers and envelopes here will enhance the fun of a writing center! Give them a pad to make a grocery list when you are getting ready to go to the store or while they are in the grocery cart.

Not all writing experiences need to be with paper and pencil. Chalk on the sidewalk, a thin layer of sand or shaving cream in a tray or even some foods like pudding make unconventional fun ways to write!

To help build up their fine motor muscles which will help them in their pencil grip, provide activities including playdough, tearing paper, threading beads or macaroni, peg boards, legos, clothespins and picking up small items using their "pinching fingers".
